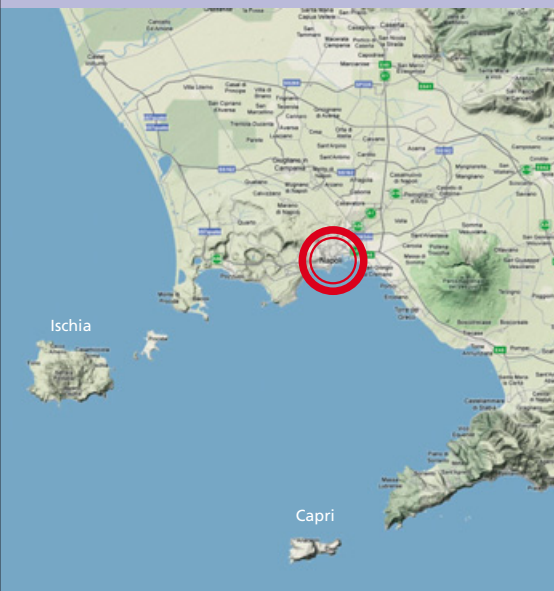

## How To Reach the Congress Venue

### BY PLANE

Fly to Naples airport, then take a taxi (the congress venue, Royal Continental Hotel is 10 Km away in downtown Naples).

If you are renting a car from the airport, directions are: Take the bypass. Exit: Fuorigrotta. After the toll, cross the underway tunnel to "Lungomare". Turn left when you are close to the Campi Flegrei station, then go on to the tunnel. After the tunnel, enter the seafront (Lungomare). After approx 1 km, you'll find Royal Continental Hotel (in front of Castel dell'Ovo, a fortress overlooking Naples bay).

### BY TRAIN

From the railway station take a taxi to the congress venue, Royal Continental Hotel (10 min ride).

### FROM NAPLES HARBORS

If you are driving:

- From Porto Beverello (1.8 Km away) turn left. Cross the "Galleria della Vittoria". Take the roundabout and enter the seafront (Lungomare) where you will find Royal Continental Hotel (in front of Castel dell'Ovo, a fortress overlooking Naples bay).
- From Porto Mergellina (2.3 Km away) go on to the seafront (Lungomare) where you will find Royal Continental Hotel (in front of Castel dell'Ovo, a fortress overlooking Naples bay).

### BY CAR

Highway exit: Napoli "Centro Porto". Go on approx. 4 Km. The Port of Naples is on the left side, the Maschio Angioino castle is on the right side. Cross the "Galleria della Vittoria". ### The Capodimonte Museum and historical Naples

Date: 01 October 2010

Full day: Capodimonte Museum, Duomo, Via S. Gregorio Armeno, Citadel of S. Chiara, Gesù Nuovo church, Castel dell'Ovo

#### Capodimonte Museum

The Capodimonte Royal Palace was created by Charles of Bourbon to accommodate his court and also because he needed a proper site to house the outstanding Farnese art collection he had inherited from his mother, Elisabetta Farnese. Works started in 1738 following the design made by Antonio Mediano, but it took more than a century to complete the building even though an important part of the Farnese Collection – in particular paintings – started being exhibited in 1759. At the beginning of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century, the paintings of the Capodimonte Palace were moved to the Royal Museum (today the Naples National Archaeological Museum) created inside the Palace of Royal Studies. The complete art collection was returned to the Capodimonte Museum in 1957 when the restored Royal Palace was opened again to the public after having been the residence of the House of Savoy from 1860 to 1947.



#### Light Lunch

Neapolitan Pizza, 1/2 liter mineral water or soft drinks, typical Neapolitan sweet.

After lunch, visit to the **Duomo**.

This majestic Cathedral was commissioned by King Charles I of Anjou. Construction started at the end of the 13<sup>th</sup> century and continued up to the early 14<sup>th</sup> century. Since the 16<sup>th</sup> century, the church houses the relics of San Gennaro (St. Januarius), the patron saint of Naples. At the beginning of the 17<sup>th</sup> century, the Royal Chapel of San Gennaro's Treasure was added to thank the Saint for the end of a plague epidemics in 1527.



## ACCOMPANYING PERSON PROGRAM



The tour continues with **San Gregorio Armeno**, the famous street of the nativity scene makers, followed by a visit to the citadel of **Santa Chiara** with its Church and Monastery and its wonderful Majolica Tiled Cloister. The Convent and Church of Santa Chiara were commissioned by Robert of Anjou in 1310 to house the Anjou Royal family tombs. Inside the complex, the most solemn ceremonies and royal gatherings took place.

The visit will continue to the **Gesù Nuovo** church.



Its façade is in bugnato style (with protruding diamond points made of volcanic stones) and is modelled on the 15<sup>th</sup> century Sanseverino's palace. This bugnato façade was maintained by the Jesuits when during the 16<sup>th</sup> century they bought the building and converted it into the church for their new seat. The Baroque interior is impressive due to the richness of polychromatic marble decorations.

Last stop of this full day tour: visit to **Castel dell'Ovo**, a castle located just 100 m far from Royal Continental Hotel.

The edifice is the most ancient castle in Naples and is located on a small island, the Megarides, where in the 1<sup>st</sup> century BC, the Roman patrician Lucius Licinius Lucullus had his villa. The first portion of the existing castle dates back to the 9<sup>th</sup> century. With the Normans, the Swabians, the Angevins and the Aragonese, the fortified citadel changed continuously in order to adapt its defensive structure to the changing needs. The current look of the castle is mainly due to the rebuilding that occurred in 1503 as the castle had been almost destroyed during a siege by Ferdinand II of Spain.

### The Archeological museum and modern Naples

Date: 02 October 2010

#### National Archaeological Museum

The palace hosting one of the most important archaeological museums in the world, was built at the end of the 16th century as a royal riding school. At the beginning of the following century, it was restored to become the seat of the University of Naples. In 1777, when Ferdinand IV of Bourbon moved the University in the former Gesù Vecchio Convent, the building was again modified to accommodate the Royal Bourbon Museum and Royal Library. In 1860 it became a state-owned building. The most interesting collections of the National Archaeological Museum comprise original objects and works of art (including mosaics and statues) discovered in the sites buried by the Mount Vesuvius eruption in the 1st century A.D. (Pompeii and Herculaneum). During the 19th century, donations by private citizens and other findings from excavation sites in



Campania region and Southern Italy enriched the Museum property. A comprehensive reorganisation of the collections is in progress, with the dual purpose of documenting the role of private collectors in assembling the archaeological property and illustrating the various findings in their specific context.

#### Light Lunch

After lunch, the tour continues to **Piazza del Plebiscito**, a square that played a very important role in the life of Naples: this was the place where festivals, celebrations, ceremonies and military parades took place. In 1815 Ferdinand of Bourbon – after the French defeat – was restored to the throne of Naples and commissioned the magnificent royal church of San Francesco di Paola.

The **Royal Palace of Naples** (visit limited to the outside of the building) dates back to the viceregal period, at the beginning of the 17<sup>th</sup> century.

The Spanish Viceroy felt the need for a spacious and prestigious palace that could sumptuously host the court and sovereigns during their trips to Naples. The architect chosen for that palace was Domenico Fontana (coming from the papal court) who drew inspiration from late- Renaissance models. During the 18th and 19th centuries, numerous additions and changes were made to embellish the building. In 1837, the Palace was seriously damaged by a fire and thus restored by Gaetano Genovese, an architect who also made a new wing (“ala delle feste”) and a new façade towards the sea.

From 1600 to 1946, the Royal Palace has been the seat of the monarchical power in Naples and Southern Italy, beginning with the Spanish and Austrian Viceroy, followed by the Bourbons and ending with the Savoy Royal family. The long façade of the Royal Palace was designed by Fontana: in the middle, you find the main entrance and above the balcony for parades.

## ACCOMPANYING PERSON PROGRAM

Sideways, there are the viceroial and royal coats of arms, with the Savoy coat of arms below. Above, you find the clock tower. The façade shows a series of arches and niches. At the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, inside these niches the Savoy family decided to place statues of the kings of the eight dynasties that ruled the Kingdom of Naples: Roger the Norman, Frederick II of Swabia, Charles I of Anjou, Alfonso V of Aragon, Charles V of Habsburg, Charles III of Bourbon, Joachim Murat, Victor Emanuel II.

From Plebiscito square, the guide will take you to **Umberto I Gallery** that at the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century became a meeting place for Neapolitan musicians. The impressive iron and glass structure and the elegant flooring with polychromatic marbles make this large area (1000 m<sup>2</sup>, 35 m high) full of light.



From the Gallery through a side exit, you can see in front of you the **Teatro San Carlo**, one of the most ancient theatres in the world. It was inaugurated on 4 November 1737, the name day of King Charles I of Bourbon.

A short walk will lead you to **Castel Nuovo** (New Castle). It was called "Castrum Novum" to distinguish it from the other two existing castles that were no longer suitable for hosting the Angevin court.

Construction started in 1279 with Charles I. Only the Palatine Chapel remains of the original structure as the castle was rebuilt by Alfonso I of Aragon, starting in 1443. Since 1990, the western wing hosts on two floors the Civic Museum, while the Sala dei Baroni (Room of the Barons) is now used for Municipal Council meetings.

### **POMPEII EXCAVATIONS**

Pompeii is the only archaeological site in the world where you can literally see an ancient Roman centre as a whole. Rich in trading activities and full of life, Pompeii “came to a halt” because of the famous eruption in 79 AD. During this eruption, a rain of ash and lapilli covered everything: houses, inhabitants, streets, public buildings and objects of daily life.

Everything was “frozen” like in a horrible snapshot. A catastrophe, a cataclysm that nonetheless gave us the opportunity to have an exceptionally well preserved town and treasures: urban pattern, public and religious monuments, the magnificent dwellings decorated with mosaics and famous wall paintings, areas where daily life activities were taking place. With a 44-hectare excavated area, Pompeii is one of the most famous and visited archaeological sites in the world, with over two million visitors each year.

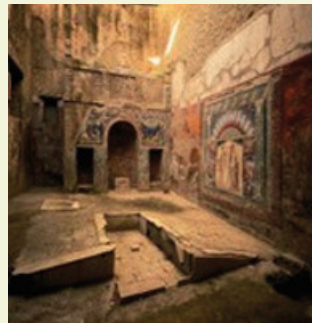

### **HERCULANEUM EXCAVATIONS**

Herculaneum is a small coastal town in Campania region, half way on the road connecting Naples to Pompeii and to Nocera, Stabia and Sorrento. Herculaneum was buried by a fast and hot river of volcanic mud – ash mixed with water – that, once solidified, preserved every-thing in an original and unique way, even organic finds such as plants, fabrics,

furniture, structural parts of wooden buildings. Unmatched at other archaeological sites is the presence of the upper floors of the buildings which give us a precise idea on volumes and building techniques, and provide the opportunity to establish the history of a Roman house through almost three centuries – from the 2nd century BC to the eruption in 79 AD. The visit starts at the entrance portal in Resina main street, from where you have a first top view of Herculaneum: you can immediately notice the classical urban pattern of a roman city, with the decumanus parallel to the coast and crossing the perpendicular cardus, thus resulting in a definite “chess-board” pattern of rectangular house blocks called

Insulae. Thanks to this top view, we can also have an overall image of the town with its public and religious monuments, the magnificent dwellings, the houses of ordinary people and places where daily life activities occurred.

## **Tour No. 2** **Capri and Anacapri** **Date: 03 October 2010**

Guided tour to the island, Marina Grande, Anacapri, Capri town center, Via Camerelle, Via Tragara

Boarding at Beverello quay, arrival after about 45 minutes.

Capri Island was inhabited in prehistoric times: traces were found in the grottos and are now visible in museums. Emperors Augustus and Tiberius lived there for long periods of time and even today you can admire the magnificent villas they commissioned for their stay at the "Blue Island".

During the 17th century AD, Christian monks commissioned the construction of a fortified charterhouse (Certosa di San Giacomo) where they also manufactured perfumes by extracting the essences from the flowers of Capri island.

The prestige and reputation of Capri developed thanks to the Grand Tour in the 19th century: artists, writers, musicians and intellectuals "discovered" and drew inspiration from it for their works.



Therefore, Capri, besides its natural beauty, boasts historical memories making it even more fascinating. A surprising feature of Capri island is the great variety of possible tours, even though the island is quite small. You can choose the atmosphere of the fishing village and sea grottos; the walks close to sheer cliffs; the fields of peasants growing lemons, oranges and olives; the streets in the town centre with luxury shops; the elegant hotels; the craftsmen's workshops; the churches; the remains of Roman Emperors' villas. The Piazzetta (Italian for "small square") – Piazza Umberto I – is the core of Capri island for both tourists and local inhabitants. In the past, the Piazzetta hosted the open market – the heart of trading for Capri Island.

Nowadays, the Piazzetta is the focal point of social life with its prestigious bars: you can now drink a coffee or an aperitif next to some international political and intellectual personalities. Capri's Piazzetta is the ideal starting place for any tour.

Along the street we can see: Villa Discopoli, a villa where the writer Rainer Maria Rilke and Queen Margherita of Savoy lived; Villa Lo Studio where the poet Pablo Neruda spent some time; Villa Tragara commissioned by the German artist Christian Wilhelm Allers; Villa Quattro Colonne owned by the painter Goffredo Sinibaldi; Hotel Punta Tragara inspired by the work of the architect Le Corbusier. You can also visit the Augustus gardens commissioned in the 30s by Friedrich Alfred Krupp, a German industrialist. There you can find species of Capri flora and wonderful panoramas with a terrace structure and different observation points from where you can see the Certosa di San Giacomo, the Faraglioni (stacks), Mount Tuoro, Marina Piccola bay and Mount Solaro.

## **Optional tour: Blue Grotto** **12.00 euros duration about 1 hour**

The Blue Grotto is known all over the world for its great extent, intense blue color of its interior and silvery white brilliance objects have when immersed in its water. To enter the Grotto, you have to get into small rowing boats, with two or three people maximum, and lying on the bottom of the boat, you pass through the low and narrow mouth of the cave. Once inside, the scenario is touching beyond description: the blue water looks like a sky where boats settle comfortably, as if they do not want to disturb the apparently absolute peace of this place.

Emperor Tiberius used it as his private nymphaeum and the painter August Kopiscv "re-discovered" it in 1826, after a period during which a legend spread among local fishermen, saying that evil spirits lived in the deepest cavities of the grotto.

### **As an alternative:** Spare time for shopping

To shop in Capri is a unique experience, a wonderful opportunity to see directly how those elegant articles the island is famous for, are made. Local artists open the door of their workshops and invite passers-by and collectors to get in and observe their works and their exhibitions of paintings, sculptures and ceramics. An opportunity not to be missed: a visit to the workshops where unforgettable perfumes are made from Capri flowers or to places where the excellent Limoncello di Capri liquor is produced in all its varieties.
